Anticoagulation: The Laboratory's Role Now and in the Future

Unfractionated and low molecular weight heparin are intravenous drugs given to hospitalized patients in order to prevent thrombosis during hospitalization. This presentation will discuss different methods used to monitor heparin with special focus on use and clinical guidelines around the anti-factor Xa tests. In addition, direct oral anticoagulants have been introduced to the market, changing the anticoagulation landscape for both patient and laboratorians.

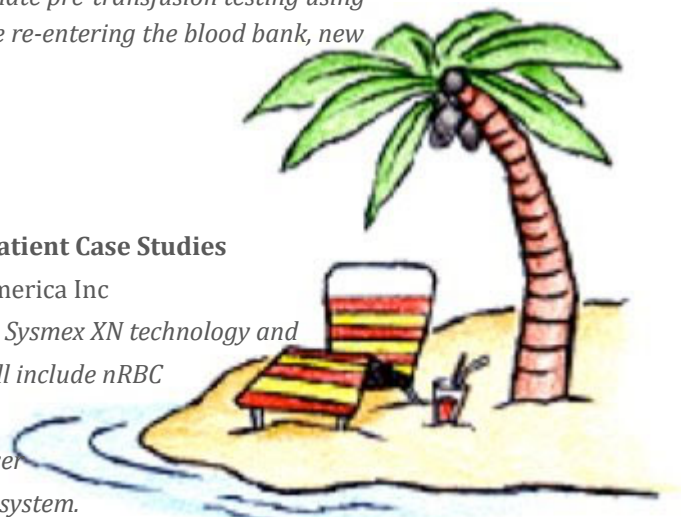
